



Bert was born on March 29, 1921 in Kitscoty, Alberta. He served for over 3 years as a Gunner in England, Central Mediterranean Area, and Continental Europe. Upon returning home, Bert purchased and farmed a $\frac{1}{4}$ of land in Kinuson where his parents had moved in 1930. He farmed with his brother Jim for a few years. In 1949, Bert married Hester McMillan from Waskada, Manitoba. They ran a post office for 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ years. Bert formed a company with a friend, Albin Lillo, C&L Logging. They logged in winter and farmed in the summer. They moved to Slave Lake for 3 years, and then to Swan Hills for 5 $\frac{1}{2}$ years.

Bert & Hester have two children; Neva is married to Tom Fleming and now lives in Millet, and Gary is presently in Saskatchewan and follows the Oil Rigs. Bert lived in Millet from May 1983, until his passing.



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James Butcher Day



James was born on December 21, 1888 in Birmingham, England. He served in the Army as Corporal for 5 years and fought in France. James and his family moved to Montreal in 1913. James enlisted in the 1914 and was wounded twice in combat. While there, he took part in action at Ypres, Passchendaele, Vimy Ridge, Amiens, and in the Battle of the Somme. He was awarded the Croix de Guerre, which was presented to him personally by King Albert of Belgium. He also was awarded the following three medals during W.W. I; the Mons Star, the British War Medal, and the Victory Medal. Following W.W.I he retired to Canada where he worked on farms in Saskatchewan, and at Viking and Ponoka. Later he purchased his own dairy farm east of Millet and farmed until his retirement in 1947.

John grew up eight miles west of Millet on his family's farm. They moved to town in 1927. John enlisted in the Calgary Tanks Reg. and trained in Camrose, Camp Bowden. Later, he was sent to Hamilton to Army Trade School for two years. He was transferred to the Royal Canadian Army Service Corp. He was prompted to corporal and spent time in Debert and Halifax, Nova Scotia. John took part in the cessation of the Halifax riot, which took place after wartime operations ceased. The riot started out as a celebration but later turned into a riot and the army was sent in to stop the rioting and looting of stores etc. After the war John drove a truck. He and his wife Jo owned a store in the 1950s for three years. In 1965 they purchased the Gray Estate and farmed until retirement in 1979. John passed away September 21, 2004.



Gerald Alvin Scott



Gerald Landed in North Africa in Reinforcement Depot in June 1943. Transferred to Sicily to the 1st Canadian Armored Brigade, Three Rivers Regiment. Major battles were Ortona and Monte Cassino in Italy. Christmas Day 1943 was spent in Ortona. Gerald remained in Italy until March 4, 1945 when the regiment moved to Western Europe. Gerald arrived in Holland, March 26, 1945 where the regiment remained until the end of the war. Gerald returned to Canada in December 1945 with the Calgary Tank Regiment and was discharged in January 1946. He returned to carpentry with his father until 1957 when he became a postmaster in Millet. Gerald retired in 1979 and lived on his farm southwest of Millet. Gerald held a Life Membership in the Millet Legion. Most of his time was spent helping out at the Millet Museum.



Dawn John was born on March 28, 1920 in Spokane, Washington. Dawn John came to Millet at the age of 3 and moved to Wetaskiwin after he had completed grade 10. From there, he moved to Peace River and trained as a butcher. Dawn was discharged from the Army due to a bad ear. He then joined the Navy where he served at sea on Cowettes, Barrie, Hipatica, Westmount, and Q097.After his discharge, Dawn worked as a butcher for the Peace River Meat Co. He later moved to Calmar and worked for Texaco Exploration for 32 years. Dawn retired in Calmar.

Frank Herbert "Bert" Loader



He was raised in England until 1925 when the family came to Wetaskiwin, Alberta and lived on a farm north west of there for a year, and then moved to a farm south west of Millet, Alberta. In 1940 Bert Joined the Royal Canadian Air Force, attained the rank of Sergeant and served until 1945 as a Mechanical Fire Fighter on the West Coast of Canada at Pat Bay, Bella Bella, and at Smithers. After the war Bert farmed until his retirement.






Benny served for five years. He came home on January 1, 1946. He lived in the Pipestone District most of his life.


John Ray Nicoll



He went to Winnipeg as a young man and engaged in fur trading which carried him to Norway and Cumberland House posts in the far north. In his later years, he was in business in LaRiviere and Swan Lake, Manitoba as a general merchant.

He came to Edmonton in 1908 and spent his last four years living with his daughter, Mrs. E.R. Hoskins, at Hillside in Millet. His kindly nature rendered him a friend to all, and in his days as a merchant he was known as the poor man's friend.


Robert Le Roi Ferguson

"Cap" as many knew him, was educated in Exeter, Devon, England and served as an apprentice with one of the large woollen firms in the city. He immigrated to Western Canada in 1909. He married Rhoda M. Pritchard in 1910. In 1913 their only son, James, was born. During this period the family moved to Edmonton. Cap joined the 51st Battalion C.E.F. (with written permission from his wife). He entered training at Sarcee Barracksin Calgary, and in June 1916 he was promoted to Sergeant. Around August 9th, in the vicinity of Rosieres, France the 29th Battaloids advance was held up by enemy machine guns. Lt. Hoskins and his section out flanked the enemy positions, destroyed them and freed the Battalion to continue the advance. For this action, Lt. Hoskins was recommended for the Military Cross. King George pinned on the award personally. Returning to Canada, he and his family settled in the Millet area on a farm in the Hillside district in July 1919. He moved into Millet in 1941, where he lived until his passing. Ernest served as an instructor in Britain and with the 49th Battalion in Edmonton. He homesteaded in Melfort, Saskatchewan. Captain - Army.



William Dowdell



William Stanley Scott





Howard Alvin Fulcher




Howard was born on March 3, 1892 in Park Hill, Ontario. Howard was stationed at Passchendaele as a runner. He was wounded in action and was sent to Orpington Hospital in London on September 25, 1918. He was discharged from Orpington on January 2, 1919 and sent back to Canada.Howard arrived in Halifax on March 1, 1919 and returned to Edmonton where he was discharged. Howard enrolled in an Agriculture Course under the auspices of S. S. B. He moved to a farm in the Wiesenthal District in the spring of 1920.


Walter Sydney Loader

Ralph's parents farmed near what was called Noyes Crossing at that time (near Onoway). His father passed away, leaving his wife and Ralph, only 17 and the eldest of a family of 6 boys and girls. He farmed the home place for a number of years. Ralph enlisted in the Air Force soon after war broke out as an Airframe Mechanic. He spent the first 6 months at youth training in Edmonton. He was then posted to St. Thomas, Ontario where he remained for a couple of years. He was then posted to Claresholm, Alberta for the remainder of the war. The highlight of his stay occurred when they were training boys from Australia - he really liked those fellows. Ralph was discharged at Neepawa, Manitoba. Ralph then returned to Millet, where his family was living. Ralph worked for 14 years for the Town of Millet until 1975 when ill health forced him to retire.




John R. Elder






Charles Justus Strand


Kenneth resided in Kelowna, B.C. and enjoyed travelling.


Edward Loader


Vernon Wesley Rathwell



After Pat's discharge in 1919, he brought a farm through 9 miles east of Millet the Soldier Settlement Board where he lived until his death in 1956.



Donald wore the same collar and gunners arm badge during WWII in the Canadian Navy that his farther, Harold wore in the Royal Navy in WWI. Donald owned McAuley Drilling, a coal drilling operation.

Joffre "Jeff" Plaquin lived a life of service and volunteerism. Jeff served in the Royal Canadian Navy as a Radioman during the Cold War, and deciphered Russian messages to keep Canada safe. Jeff became an educator at the age of 32, and spent much of his career as a school principal. After Jeff's wife, Rosella, retired, they moved to Millet, AB. Jeff was a lifetime member of the Knights of Columbus, 3rd and 4th degrees. He was an active member of the Royal Canadian Legion for over 55 years, and was awarded a Life Membership, the Meritorious Service Medal, the Palm Leaf, and the Sovereign's Medal for Volunteers.
